


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

Navaratri in Sanskrit means nine nights. Through these nine nights, people offer prayers and devotion to the Nine Forms of Maa Durga also known as Navadurga. Each form represents a different aspect of Durga which brings about a meaning as to why people worship each one as well as allowing us to apply these representations to our daily lives.

(1) Goddess Shailaputri - Daughter of Mountain

As we know Goddess Durga is a form of Goddess Parvati, who is the wife of Lord Shiva and mother of Ganesha and Karthikeya. Parvati was born as the daughter of the Himalayas Mountain. Shailaputri is the first manifestation of Durga. She is deemed as the embodiment of patience and devotion since she had to go on a long journey from her father to her husband, Shiva. This teaches us how patience is a virtue and thus showing the importance of applying this to our behaviour.

(2) Goddess Brahmacharini - Mother of Devotion and Penance

This form symbolises Parvati when she was in deep meditation for Shiva to accept her as his wife. She suffered the torment of nature and extreme weather, but she remained resolute in her devotion for a strict penance of a thousand years. Goddess Brahmacharini can inspire us to remain loyal to our beliefs. In a world of many troubles and demanding situations, we should continue to live our lives without getting disheartened.

(3) Goddess Chandraghanta – Destroyer of Demons

Goddess Chandraghanta is the fierce 10-armed goddess who rides a tiger to destroy all evil and wicked, hence the name Destroyer of Demons. Although in modern day we are not literally destroying demons, this can be interpreted metaphorically where we destroy our inner evils that drive us to make bad decisions and do wrong doings.

(4) Goddess Kushmanda – Goddess of The Cosmic Egg

This refers to Durga's role as the creator of the universe. The world is something that was created with great detail and so it should be admired and respected by all. Additionally, this form is presented as the embodiment of happiness and harmony, which we should all strive to have.

(5) Goddess Skandamata - Goddess of Motherhood and Children

Goddess Skandamata is depicted with her six-headed infant son, Karthikeya on her lap, Her power lies in the strength of a mother's love. She blesses her devotees devoid of selfishness, with the same love and warmth as a mother would with her children. A mother is the most significant figure of attachment from the moment a child is born. Their physical and emotional development is dependent on the bond between them and their mother. Durga is our universal mother. This teaches us the importance of respecting our own mothers or mother figures as we would with Maa Durga as well as taking care of children as parents.

(6) Goddess Katyayani - Goddess of Power

This form is considered one of Durga's most violent forms who is known to vanquish all evil. She is a form of shakti, meaning power. As the goddess of power, Katyayani teaches us to be bold and powerful. Although we may not have the strength to solve all problems, we should correctly apply what power, no matter how little, we have in order to make changes.

(7) Goddess Kalaratri – Goddess of Auspiciousness and Courage

Goddess Kalaratri represents the darkness and light that we experience throughout life. She teaches us that we should not get discouraged when going through rough times. Instead, we should be courageous and fearless so that we can fight the obstacles that prevent us from succeeding in life. Rather we should be learning from these moments, so we know what to do for next time.

(8) Goddess of Mahagauri – Goddess of Beauty and Women

Maa Durga in general is a beautiful representation of feminine power. Mahagauri shows us that women can be powerful, strong, and courageous which are usually biased as masculine traits in modern society. Moreover, Mahagauri teaches us the importance of inner beauty in addition to outer beauty. Being an all-around good person with morals allows us to create meaningful bonds and long-lasting relationships. Of course, it is still perfectly acceptable to care about how you look for your own personal comfort, but a balance should be made between the two.

(9) Goddess Siddhidhatri – Goddess of Supernatural Powers

Siddhidhatri is one of Maa Durga's most divine forms. She represents pure perfection through her supernatural abilities. Although, we do not have these as human beings, we can strive to improve ourselves even if we cannot reach perfection. The effort is what counts. She also teaches us the importance of increasing knowledge, which is something we do all throughout our lives from birth. We should therefore value acquiring knowledge.



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
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
